Centennial Service Challenge

As we continue this year to participate in the Centennial Service Challenge I have been presenting some of our clubs with the banner patches that they were awarded for their past year's activities. The four areas of the Centennial Service Challenge are: Engaging our youth, Protecting the environment, Sharing the vision and Relieving the hunger. Our District earned a total of forty awards ranging from level one to level four. Level four recognizes completion of service projects in all four of the previously listed areas. There are 26 Lions clubs that will receive the level four banner patches when I complete my presentations. All of our District should be congratulated for receiving these awards.

This past year we have determined that most of our Lions clubs were doing activities that qualify for the awards but unfortunately due to lack of or incorrect reporting procedures to MyLCI many clubs didn't get credit for the activities they had worked. I would like to encourage our club secretaries to complete their monthly reports correctly and on time. Training is always available for anyone needing instructions about using MyLCI. Help with MyLCI is only a phone call away. Call the MyLCI Support Center at (630) 468-6900 or e-mail to mylci@lionsclubs.org. Also locally, Lion Jay Newland has accepted the position of District Assistant Administrative Assistant. She deserves some credit for the great participation and awards our clubs earned from last year as she personally assisted several club secretaries in completing the CSC reports. Another component of the Centennial Year Celebration is for us to build a Legacy of Service. We can leave a tangible mark in our community by completing projects that have a lasting effect. Starting with level one Projects such as erecting new Lions signs or donating a park bench. Level two projects require more time and finances such as refurbishing a park or playground but they still are manageable for most of our larger Lions clubs. The third level for Legacy projects requires the most resources and examples include things such as build a clinic or expand a library or school. The Manchester and Mowrystown Lions clubs did receive the Gold Legacy awards which represents a level three Legacy project. Our district did receive 12 Legacy awards for this past year, so I'm happy to present these banner patches as well. I'd like to challenge our District to double the awards that we will receive next year. As I've stated, we already do service projects, can we do better in our reporting?

While we all can put in an extra effort to do more in service to others what will really have the greatest impact is to increase our membership. We need to have more Lions to expand our ability to SERVE. The new member and sponsor certificates and pins reflect the Centennial year's event and are special. I'm hoping to use the 25 new member kits that LCI has provided me and need to order more!

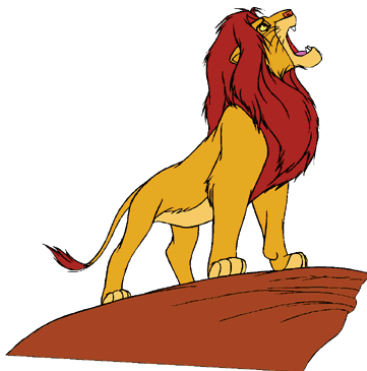

Our district also supported the recent Tour de Cure to support diabetes research. Many clubs supported this by working at the various stations, including my own. - Complications include: skin and nerve complications, heart attack or stroke, coma/death, kidney disease or failure, loss of circulation/amputation, hearing impairment, risk of Alzheimer's

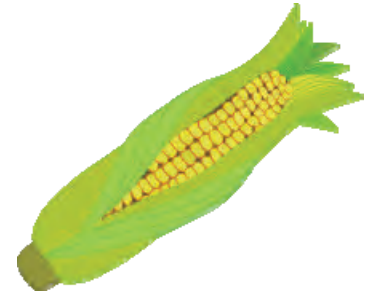
