Leadership

1. **Be confident.** A world of difference exists between saying, "I don't know" *nervously and uncertainly* and saying "I don't know" *confidently*.
2. **Be kind but firm.** Being a leader means having to set boundaries, but boundaries can be set gently and compassionately. People will not only respect the boundaries you set but *you* as well.
3. **Be an expert.** However long it takes, whatever you have to do, know what you're talking about. Don't ever try to fake content knowledge. If you don't know what you need to know, find it out.
4. **Be decisive.** A great leader listens to a diversity of opinions, asks probing questions, debates issues, challenges positions—but when the time to discuss and debate is over, makes a decision and moves on.
5. **Be willing to have people disagree with you.** If you're setting appropriate boundaries and taking strong positions, some people may not only disagree with you but actively dislike you. Don't take it personally.
6. **Know when to spend time building a consensus and when to make an executive decision.** Learn to recognize when it's time to take over.
7. **Have a vision.** A vision that excites the people who follow you, that inspires them in such a way that they perform (or want to perform) at a level they didn't know they could.
8. **Care about the people you lead.** Genuine concern is always perceived and appreciated—and far more motivating than any punitive measure could ever be.
9. **Mentor people.** Great leaders always have people who want to learn from them. Think about what each of your choices will teach the people around you.
10. **Fully visualize every repercussion of each of your decisions in advance.**

I attended some training sessions and listened to some great motivational speakers including our International President Lion Bob Corlew.

The climax for me was the Graduation ceremony where I received my Master's degree from the USA/Canada University. I was one of 330 Lions who received either the Bachelor, the Master's or both degrees presented by International President Bob Corlew. We all had our photos taken of the presentation of certificates. Attending the Forum provides Lions the opportunity to improve their leadership skills while being in the company of some of the Lions Clubs International highest ranking leaders. From the present International President to past International Presidents, current International Directors and Past International Directors. Also, many members of LCI staff officials. Numerous organizations with their booths and of course the Lions store where we could purchase Lions authorized apparel and items.

Attending a Forum is seeing a whole new side of being a Lion, the side of being a LEADER! While all Lions Serve their communities as volunteers by doing the very necessary activities of raising funds and completing service projects that forms the core of being a Lion, there is also the need for Lions to serve as Leaders. I should state that being a Lion Leader does not make you better but rather only performing a different kind of service. Lion Clubs International is just like any other Organization it requires a structure that begins at the club level and advances to the International level. There is always a need for Lion Leaders at all levels although the higher the level the more competitive it becomes mostly because there are fewer positions available, as in the case of the one and only International President.

My experience limited as it is, shows the greatest needs are at the lowest levels meaning clubs, zones and districts. How many times have we had to repeat club officer's positions, sometimes because the officer wants to stay doing that task but many times it's because nobody else wants to be the club secretary, club treasurer or the club president. The same is true for zone chairs and district governors. I for one know that I am a District Governor today because nobody challenged me for the position of 2nd Vice District Governor. I believe being a Lion Leader has its own rewards not unlike the joy we receive knowing we helped someone in need. I have found what a great feeling it is to be on the leadership team. I appreciate the help from other Lion Leaders who mentored and encouraged me to take the training offered by the Lions to prepare me to be able to accept responsibility for the various positions that I have served. I was asked and attended the Senior Advanced Lions Leadership Institute in February 2013.

I now want to ask potential Lions Leaders to consider serving as a Leader and start taking training for where you would like to serve be it at your Lions club or if qualified as a district officer. Please contact me if you want to learn more about serving in Lions Leadership.

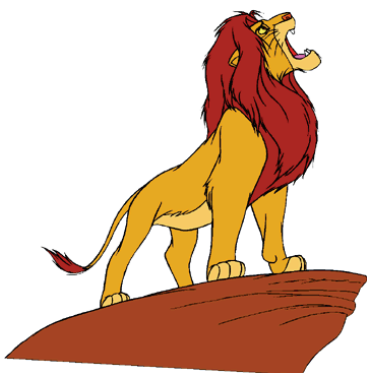

LIONS ALL, WE HAVE A MAJOR PROBLEM!

“Decreased Numbers of Members”

Re-districting does nothing about the losses in membership, but does give better footing for each new district. It's only a band aid, temporarily covered-up the effects of the long term loss of the numbers of Lions Club Members across Ohio. Since about 1980, with membership numbers approaching 20,000 and recently we have approximately 13,000 members in Ohio.

In past years when our old districts have positive growth in membership it was basically when new clubs were chartered. Membership, adding new members to our existing clubs is necessary to replace members who pass away, moved to other areas, or resign from our clubs. Likewise, retention, retaining current members, is also a factor in membership. If we continue doing what we have been doing with Membership and Retention-- the results will continue to be the same, declining membership numbers.

As a member of the Global Membership Team 'GMT', the Extension Chairperson for District 13 OH6, I have a request: Let's form a working District Extension Team of volunteers, whose primary duty will be to charter new clubs.

This team will need dedicated individuals who are willing to make a commitment to grow Lionism. The team will be composed of Guiding Lions, (knowledgeable of Lionism); Canvassers (Lions with the skill to build contacts), administration competencies, the willingness to learn more about today's communities, and Lions Clubs to sponsor new clubs.

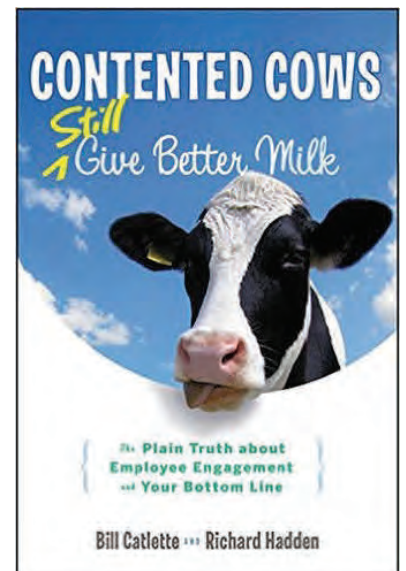

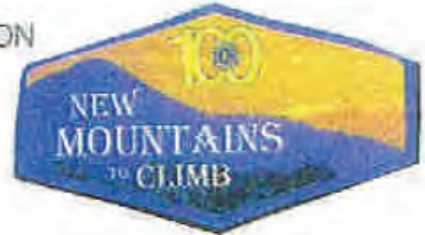
