I want to thank everyone who participated in my District Convention, I have received only positive comments about this year's event. I'm sure some of you realize that this District's Convention planning began almost a year and a half ago. For the Convention Chairs, our CST and myself there were many hours and miles traveled to make it happen. All this preparation would have been in vain if it wasn't for the Lions who attended, that is what really mattered. I was given the opportunity to recognize our District's Lions for their work and to demonstrate the unity of our new District. Unfortunately, some of the award winners were not present to receive their recognitions in person.

I was honored to have six other District Governor's in attendance, so far, of the six District Convention's that have taken place, this was the only Convention with all seven current District Governor's in attendance. The last District Convention for this year is for District 13 OH3, the last week-end of April.

Our guest speaker, ID Howard Hudson gave a very good speech in which he told us how he wanted to become a member of the Kiwanis Club, like his father. He tried for several years but was never invited. Then he shared with us how he was invited to visit a Lions Club meeting and was asked to join the Lions. He stated that the reason he wasn't a Kiwanian was because he was never asked! The point of his story is the reason why any of us are Lions is because someone asked us to become Lions. He went on to encourage us to ASK someone to become a Lion. As I have pointed out several times, our International President Bob Corlew has a goal for us to reach the highest membership in our one-hundred year history, That number would be 1,425,311 members. As of April 25th our world-wide membership is 1,420,190 which means we're still 5,111 members short, with just a little over two months left in our year. Our District membership was 1905 members on this same date. I want to ask our District Lions to continue to ask their friends and relatives to join us as Lions during our Centennial Year!

I want to take this opportunity to say how proud I am of our new District for the way we have come together and worked as one Organization. I have been able to witness ways that several clubs, from both former Districts, have worked together on projects. Also, some of the Organizations such as Kamp Dovetail have received greater funding and volunteers since we became a larger District. I am optimistic that we have a great start and will only increase our success as we move into our second year.

I want to congratulate our new District Officers; DG elect John Bond and 1st VDG elect Lydia Houser, who were nominated and elected at our District Convention. I wish them good luck and much success as they take over on July 1, 2017.



The belief that if we kept doing what we have been doing things will get better. Most Lions serve locally. The collective accomplishments have been fantastic during the majority of our first century. District 13OH6 recorded in the final report booklet are impressive accomplishments. The recorded successes have been on going over the past decades. Lions are GREAT!

Along with our successes are unattended tasks which include: aging membership, poor retention rates, decrease in numbers, and a lack of significant numbers of servant-leaders. Yes, Lions have expended many hours and hard work toward growing Lionism. Thank you for your efforts. But, the overall numbers have continued to decline. I believe that everything and everyone can get better.

My Mentor, Mr. John Burton, told me; “jobs are not difficult if you know what you are doing”. But beyond knowing what to do, today's situation requires consistent personal values, while demonstrating flexibility in the role we play with others. Our message will not be heard unless it assists others toward reaching their goals. Lions need to focus on adding value to others. Steps 1 & 2 were about taking time to think: “Create your Vision” and “Fuel Your Vision with Purpose”.

Step 3 “Write Down Your Vision/Purpose Statement”.

Incorporate your vision and purpose into one powerful vision statement and **write it down**. Until you put your ideas into words, they are just notions in the wind and are likely never going to mature. John Maxwell has developed his three-E formula for creativity:

- Exposure of an idea to the right people
- + Expression from their different perspectives
- = Expansion of that idea beyond my personal ability

Consensus is often difficult to obtain, but EXPOSURE to as many club members as possible is paramount to: success, leaving a legacy of community service, and longevity. Because, EXPRESSION and getting your members on board require you putting your ideas in words. Thus knowing and articulating where you are going with today’s overload of possibilities in our rapid changing environment serves as a navigation aid. The EXPANSION of your ideas serves to change spectators into participators. The exposition of information spreads needs over a larger area and often degrades vision of local needs. OH! what possibilities exist, but we have limited resources.

In recent decades ~ most organizations have designed and published their Mission Statement. Lions Clubs International (LCI) mission Statement says: “To empower volunteers to service their communities, meeting humanitarian needs, encourage peace and promote international understanding through Lions clubs”. This is not a club level purpose but may be supportive. Each Lions Club is unique, a building block of LCI, but a separate entity. We not only need our own club level mission statement but it needs to be written down and exposed to our local community. We are here and this is what we do. Maybe you need to partner and support other organizations if doing so adds value toward your purpose.

MYLCI Reporting – Hints to Complete this Lions Year – Category: **HUNGER**

25 Project Ideas for Relieving Hunger (from LCI Brochure)

1. Sponsor a community food drive to replenish a local food pantry.
2. Volunteer to deliver prepared meals to elderly citizens.
3. Organize a feeding program at a local school to provide healthy, nutritious meals.
4. Prepare and deliver food baskets to families in need.
5. Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
6. "Adopt" a family struggling to put food on their table. Take them shopping for fruits/vegetables.
7. Organize an event to benefit the food bank in your community; use cans of food as admission.
8. Hold a hunger walk and use proceeds to buy food for a children's orphanage or shelter.
9. Create snack packages to be distributed to children in need.
10. Collaborate with other service organizations in the community to take turns hosting a meal for needy people.
11. Partner with local restaurants or food markets. Pick up donations of fresh food items for a women's or children's shelter.
12. Create a cookbook of inexpensive, easy-to-make recipes.
13. Start a food co-operative to serve as a resource for healthy food at a more affordable price.
14. Accompany and assist a person who is blind with food shopping.
15. Collect infant formula and baby food for an organization serving young mothers at risk.
16. Provide a healthy snack or meal for a group of needy children who are in an after – school program.
17. Work with healthcare professionals to provide free classes on nutrition and food preparation.
18. Provide apples or another type of fruit as a healthy snack for children in childcare facilities.
19. Provide transportation for elderly residents so they can shop for food.
20. Teach children to bake a loaf of bread that they can take home to their family.
21. Invite a local food bank representative to speak at a club or district meeting.
22. Work with schools to provide needy children with backpacks supplied with food for periods when school is not in session.
23. Host a picnic or BBQ at a park for the local community.
24. Help local residents establish a community vegetable garden where they can grow their own food.
25. Arrange a demonstration of proper hand washing for local school children.

District OH6 clubs are reporting: collect nonperishable items – donate to food pantry; club members work a shift at a local food pantry distributing food; club assembles food basket/bags and deliver to families in need; pack weekend bags/backpacks for children in need; club members off load a truckload of food items at local food pantry; serve meals at a homeless shelter; prepare and serve meals to veteran military members & families; During Thanksgiving and Christmas there were several clubs that put together food baskets along with gifts for families; Fruit baskets delivered to widows/widowers in community; work at Feed the Children project packing meals in Cincinnati.
