

"What will a Service Club look like in the Future?"

What are your community's needs? How do you determine these needs and how can you best address those needs?





I would recommend asking service organizations operating in your community or county. Investigating Highland County, I became aware of the following organizations: Continuum Care, Ohio Means Jobs, Prevention Coalition, Hope of Highland County, and several better-known organizations such as Samaritan Outreach, the Homeless Shelter, Community Action, School Administrators, the animal shelter, both the police and County Sheriff, Fire and Rescue, County Commissioners, Township Trustees, City Managers, and the Counsel-of-Ministers. The sum of the other service organizations leaves holes which need to be filled. They are very aware of their short comings in community services. We can partnership with their efforts or pickup areas which are unattended, but we need to look at the following: Sight, Environment, Pediatric Cancer, Diabetes, and Hunger. These areas are world-wide and commitments made by our organization.

Beyond a list of current service projects being Global; let's expand our Lions Clubs to be inclusive, Local. Originally, Lions Clubs were made up with similar type people from the business sector, who had the means to satisfy needs. In today's communities with rapid changing environment, technology, immediate communications possibilities, mobility, and a diverse population we need Lions Clubs who can meet their community's needs. We need to be diverse because diversity in membership gives different perspectives of needs and possible solutions. If we are similar in social status, with similar characteristics and expectations; likely our observation of needs will be similar. Thus, a club of the future will need to be inclusive of Laborers thru CEOs and inputs from every generation.



- Promote advertising space, e.g. business ads, recognize a special Lion, promote your District, Congratulate your District Governor, etc. in the 2018 State Convention Commemorative Program; advertising revenue is used to help offset the cost of the Ohio Lions State Convention.


