FABRÍCIO OLIVEIRA - INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT Fabrício Oliveira of Catolé do Rocha, Paraiba, Brazil, was elected to serve as International President of Lions Clubs International at our association's 106th International Convention, from June 21 through June 25, 2024, in Melbourne, Australia. International President Fabrício is a businessman, with a post-graduate degree in business management (MBA) from Fundação Getúlio Vargas (FGV), and a degree in business administration. A member of the Catolé do Rocha Lions Club since 1985, International President Fabrício has held several offices in the association, among them, club president, zone chairperson, region chairperson, district governor, Multiple District LA first council of governors chairperson, and international director. He also has served as multiple district leadership development chairperson, having coordinated the district governors-elect seminar, multiple district SightFirst committee chair, and chair of the district Lions Foundation. International President Fabrício also served twice as District Governors-Elect Seminar group leader.

In recognition of his service to the association he has received several awards, including the 100% Club President Award, the District Governor Excellence Medal, District Governor's Extension Award for chartering nine Lions clubs, the District Governor's Membership Growth Award (net 312), Service Award, seven Council Chairperson's Appreciation Medals, 19 International Presidents' Certificates of Appreciation, the Augustin Soliva Medal, the Paradigm Medal, nine Leadership Medals, 16 Presidential Medals, International Director Recognition Medal and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor awarded by the association to its members. President Fabrício has also received a Key Award for sponsoring 30 new members, an Extension Certificate for sponsoring five new Leo clubs, the Global Vision Medal for his efforts in Campaign SightFirst and the Helping Hands Award given by Lions Clubs International Foundation. He has also been recognized as a Lions International Second Century Ambassador, as well as being a Multilevel Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. In addition to his Lion achievements, International President Fabrício participates in numerous professional and community organizations, having served as the secretary of industry and commerce of the state of Paraiba and an administration council chairperson of several companies. President Fabrício served as director of the National Confederation of Shopkeepers (CNDL), chairperson of the Federation of Chambers of Shopkeepers of the State of Paraíba (FCDL-PB), chairperson of Catolé do Rocha Chamber of Shopkeepers (CDL). International President Fabrício and his wife, Amariles, also a member of the Catolé do Rocha Lions Club and a Melvin Jones Fellow, have two daughters, a son and a granddaughter.

#### **LCIF Report**

In early October, I sent an email note to all the clubs in our District asking for help/donations for our Southeastern states of Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and others effected by Hurricane Helene. Then shortly afterwards we had Hurricane Milton to hit Florida. Thanks to several Clubs and individual Lions in our District, we have responded to this call for help. If your Club has not had a chance to respond to this call, we are still in need of disaster relief and other humanitarian assistance throughout the year, and hopefully you will be able to donate later this Lions year. From a mid-October LCIF report, LCIF has already awarded 13 grants totaling \$365,000.00 for hurricane relief efforts to the affected areas. Eleven districts have received Emergency grants totaling \$165,000.00 in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee plus there were two Major Catastrophe grants awarded \$100,000.00 each to the Lions of Florida and North Carolina for a total of \$365,000.00; and LCIF is still processing additional requests as they come in. Immediate needs for water, food, infant needs, personal

hygiene items, cleaning supplies, etc. were given. Thank you to the Clubs who have already sent in a donation to LCIF, but if you haven't, please consider a donation to LCIF. Again, this year, there are Presidential Fabricio Oliveira personal LCIF pins for individual Lions who make a donation of \$50 to \$99; \$100 to \$199, and over \$200.00. this Lions year. Last year was the first for these Presidential pins of IPP Patti Hill. I am hoping we will have more District 13 OH-6 Clubs and Individual Lions answer the call to help.

# Glasses Collections and Drop Off's to Glass Collection POCs

Collecting used glasses to include prescription, sunglasses and reading glasses are one of the many tasks that our Lions do. If you collect glasses, please contact one of our Eye Glasses Collection POCs (Lions Patrick Bookman (513-448-5525) and Linn Davey (614-701-0479)) to get them to them. Please do not wait until you have 20,000 pairs. You can make arrangements to meet them, have them attend a club meeting and talk about the program, meet them at a Zone meeting, etc. Sometimes, a Zone Chairperson will even collect them for the POCs, but you need to make sure you arrange this prior to bringing a bunch of glasses to a meeting for them to take. The glasses are an important part of the Lions vision program, and it does us no good to hold on to them. They need to be collected and taken to our POCs so that they can get them out to those in need of them. Sight should never be taken for granted and if we can help someone see better, we have done a great service. Please ensure that all glasses are counted and boxed up (no bags please).

- Packing boxes should be marked with the number of glasses contained and the name of the club supplying them.
- Packing boxes should be of manageable size (20 to 30 pounds).
- Clubs delivering glasses to the collection points should submit their MAR information for credit. The collection point will not do that for individual clubs.

## LEBWCO BESSON TUBE

The Lions Eye Bank of West Central Ohio (LEBWCO) launched the Besson Tube in May 2024, a new preloaded cannula to simplify DSAEK cornea transplantation procedures. The innovative proprietary glass cannula, produced by Gunther Weiss, enables DSAEK surgeries to be completed quickly and efficiently. The new preloaded DSAEK was named after Dr. Michael Besson, one of the founding members of LEBWCO. Without him, the LEBWCO would not be able to enhance the lives of many through the gift of sight.

# CATARACT AWARENESS

A Cataract is a clouding of the eye's lens. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), a cataract is the leading cause of blindness worldwide and the leading cause of vision loss in the United States. Additionally, an estimated 20.5 million Americans who are 40 years and older have a cataract in one or both eyes.

More than half of all Americans have a cataract by the time they are 80 years old. However, cataracts can also be found in young people or even newborn babies (congenital). Risk factors for developing cataract include:

- Intense heat or long-term exposure to UV rays from the sun
- Certain diseases, such as diabetes
- Inflammation in the eye
- Hereditary influences
- Events before birth, such as German measles in the mother
- Long-term steroid use (medicines used to treat some health problems, like arthritis or allergies)
- Eye injuries
- Eye diseases, such as glaucoma
- Smoking

The Cleveland Clinic states that cataract surgery is one of the most common procedures, with surgeons performing more than 3 million cataract surgeries in the United States, and 20 million globally, improving vision for 97 percent of patients. Make sure to talk to your eye doctor about your risk for cataracts and what you can do to keep your eyes healthy and your vision clear.

#### **Environmental Initiatives News & Notes**

#### Reducing the Curbside Trash Collection to an absolute Minimum

The United States is the top per capita producer of MSW (~ 5 lbs. in 2018) in the world. About 40% of this is recycled, composted, or diverted via other pathways. If we really want to, we could do much better than that.

My neighbor Cathy Engel has set an example. Cathy is a swimming coach at the Powel Crosley, Jr. YMCA in Cincinnati, a fellow yogi, and an avid recycler. According to my granddaughter, Ms. Engel is one the finest swimming coaches.

Our household weekly "garbage/trash" from day-to-day activities can generally be separated into the following categories/bins:



- foods and yard stuff leaves, grass clippings, etc.
- Paper products plates, cups, drink cartons
- Non-compostable
  - o Plastic, Styrofoam household items, take-out boxes from restaurants
  - Plastic and metal household and yard items
  - Used paints, motor oils, cleaning fluids and stuff (check w/your MSW company)
  - o Batteries, light bulbs, chords, computers and accessories

Cathy's curb-side trash minimization strategy is simple.

- Maintain a compost pile for food waste and grass clippings and related yard stuff.
- Use the Rumpke recycling bin for its standard recyclable items.

- Take the items not accepted in the Rumpke recycle bin to the Cincinnati Recycling and Reuse Hub. The Hub accepts "soft" plastics for free but charges a fee for other items. https://www.cincinnatirecyclingandreusehub.org/.

Cathy was excited to learn about our "Bags-to-Benches" program and plans to initiate one in her Ft. Thomas, Kentucky, UMC, where she is a part of the church's Green Team.

Plastic products are typically labeled with a number surrounded by the recycling symbol. These numbers and labels identify both the type of resin used to make the plastic and the products?! recyclability. Associated with the different types of resin are potential health risks. The attached pdf summanzes seven different types of commonly used plastics, product exemples, recyclability, and potential health risks.




