

You'll also learn about Lions fundamentals — our history, principles and structures, as well as the benefits of membership in Lions.

Leadership skills you'll learn at RLLI Level 1:

- Working in teams
- Lions Fundamentals
- Diversity
- Local issues and opportunities
- Public Speaking
- Time Management
- · Personal Mission Statement
- Member Motivation
- · Goal Setting

These are basic skills every business utilizes and every business owner seeks in great workers and the type of workers who get promoted.

Want to be an officer in your club? Take RLLI and make sure your current club officers know you have an interest in becoming a leader in your club. Mentor with a current club officer. Let your District Officers know you have an interest being a zone chair. They can help you get into office in your club to help you work toward getting to that President position so you are eligible to be a zone chair. We NEED Lions to step up into service at the District level. Serving in this capacity is a lot of

fun and very worthwhile. PLUS you get to know a lot of Lions you wouldn't otherwise get a chance to know.

RLLI Level 3 is by invitation from those Lions who have completed Level 2. This is lead by an experienced LCI approved leader. This is a project focused session and the group decides on the project they would like to accomplish. It's a very structured yet creative process and it's success or failure depends on the group as a whole. It's an amazing process and you come out of this session energized and with skills you've learned from the previous 2 sessions being put to use that you didn't think possible or hadn't used previously. It's a wonderful experience. This level is where Ohio started our STEPS walk and where LCI came up with Children's Pediatric Cancer as one of their initiatives – It all started in Ohio!

What is Emerging Lions Leadership Institute?

A 2-3 Day event where participants learn valuable leadership skills and strategies for overcoming obstacles and create opportunities to strengthen leadership abilities within your club. Members should have already served on a club committee and not yet attained the position of club president when considering participating in this institute.

You'll start with an opening session where you meet the faculty and the other participants. All faculty are LCI approved trainers! They must have previous training experience to be approved by LCI to teach these classes. You'll learn about Lions Past, Present and Future – exploring the relationship between the history of Lions and the roles of Lions leaders. This gives you a change to consider opportunities for the future.

Leadership skills you'll learn at ELLI Level 1:

- Supporting Lions Teams
- Communication
- Conducting Effective Meetings
- Diversity

These are basic skills you will learn on your way toward leadership in your club. Building these skills will help you not just in your club but also help you become the type of worker who gets promoted.

Taking ELLI will help you build the leadership skills you need as you work your way toward president of your club and beyond. ELLI sets you up to successfully working your way toward taking the RLLI course to Zone and District Leadership. Do you need ELLI to take RLLI? No. If you are already a leader in your work or community life you are ready for RLLI. But you can still benefit from learning about these courses by taking ELLII

Ask prospective members to help at community service activities and fundraisers. Every club have a new community service activity every year (plus their others).

Do a GMA (Global Membership Approach) in the district (renamed NAMI).

Do a SWOT (Strength, Weakness, Opportunities, and Threats) in the district (and possibly clubs).

- ❖ O Scholarships (Talk to parents afterwards. Empty nest syndrome.)
- ❖ T Too busy/competing orgs/cost of living/travel/club not buying into suggestions/etc.

Specialty Clubs

❖ Veteran, Cigar, Animal Rescue, Beds for Kids (Sleep in Heavenly Peace is one organization mentioned), Medical Supplies, Family Clubs, Community Gardens, Downs Syndrome, Autistic, All kinds of other specialty clubs (the sky is the limit)

Do a community service activity to thank the community (hot dog/hamburger, chips, drink, etc.).

Promote on social media (clubs, Facebook, X, Instagram, newspapers, tv, radio, etc.). Invite members that have dropped in last 3 years to special meetings to see why they quit. Ask if they would like to rejoin. What they liked/disliked about the club. See what they are interested in doing, etc.

If someone would like to join but can't afford to, ask club members to help pay for the prospective member.

Spreading Lionism is service.

You don't have to join Lions and go to meetings. Just help with the community service activities and fundraisers.

Google non-profit and talk to them about joining Lions.

Libraries are the future of Lions. Offer to help them. Possibly start a branch club there. Use a grant to help market Lions.

LCIF Report

LCIF, Lions Clubs International Foundation, has been very busy the last few months in helping with disasters right here in our own United States. We put a plea out in the fall for help with the hurricanes in the southeastern states of Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and nearby areas after Hurricanes Helene and Milton went through. Thanks for the support from clubs right here in our District, Clubs throughout the country and the world as well as from many individual Lions much support was received. My latest report shows that nearly \$400,000.00 has been sent to those areas. There were 2 Major Catastrophe Grants of \$100,000.00 each sent to the Lions of Florida and to the Lions of North Carolina. LCIF is still helping with those affected in those areas. Thank you for answering the call for help.

In the past month another call was asked for help with the California Wildfires. I placed an article in our last issue of the District newsletter asking for help with the wildfire disaster. LCIF has already sent two Emergency grants for \$15,000.00 each as well as a Major Catastrophe grant of \$100,000.00 to the affected area. More grants are being considered as they come in. Thank you for your support. If your Club hasn't donated yet, there is still time to do so. No amount is too small. All donations given are added to your Club's Melvin Jones Fellow account and with each \$1,000.00 accumulated you are entitled to name a Melvin Jones Fellow or a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Not only does LCIF help with disaster relief, but grants are also given for vision, diabetes, hunger, pediatric cancer, environmental issues, and other areas of need. LCIF is our Lions Foundation, and we should be proud of all that we do throughout the world to help those in need.

For those attending the State Convention in May in helping to celebrate Helen Keller's 100th anniversary of speaking at Cedar Point asking the Lions to be Knights of the Blind, LCIF representatives from Oak Brook will be attending and presenting a program on Saturday to answer any questions you might have about LCIF, the various grants, their Legacy program and anything you might want to know about our Foundation. Plan to attend this session.

Glasses Collections and Drop Off's to Glass Collection POCs

Collecting used glasses to include prescription, sunglasses and reading glasses are one of the many tasks that our Lions do. If you collect glasses, please contact one of our Eye Glasses Collection POCs (Lions Patrick Bookman (513-448-5525) and Linn Davey (614-701-0479)) to get them to them. Please do not wait until you have 20,000 pairs. You can make arrangements to meet them, have them attend a club meeting and talk about the program, meet them at a Zone meeting, etc. Sometimes, a Zone Chairperson will even collect them for the POCs, but you need to make sure you arrange this prior to bringing a bunch of glasses to a meeting for them to take. The glasses are an important part of the Lions vision program, and it does us no good to hold on to them. They need to be collected and taken to our POCs so that they can get them out to those in need of them. Sight should never be taken for granted and if we can help someone see better, we have done a great service. Please ensure that all glasses are counted and boxed up (no bags please).

- Packing boxes should be marked with the number of glasses contained and the name of the club supplying them.
- Packing boxes should be of manageable size (20 to 30 pounds).
- Clubs delivering glasses to the collection points should submit their MAR information for credit. The collection point will not do that for individual clubs.

- Cancel paper mail: Opt into email communications instead






